"Silent Night" Introduction

It was a cold night on Christmas Eve in 1818 in a small Austrian village, that part-time school teacher/part-time church organist, Franz Gruber put a poem by his friend, Father Joseph Mohr, to music for the service.

The church organ had been damaged after recent floods, so Franz Gruber was asked to make a guitar accompaniment for the song. On that cold night, in a small Austrian church in a tiny village was first sung what was to become one of the most widely recognized melodies in the world, "Silent Night".

This simple Christmas carol has been translated into 140 languages and has become the fourth best-selling single of all time.

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The Key "Silent Night" is customarily written in Bb in most hymnals and songbooks but it is commonly played on guitar in G - capoing at the 3rd fret if needed.

Song Form It is 24 measures long with three verses typically sung – although in some hymnals there is a fourth verse included.

Time Signature It is in 3/4 time with 3 beats per measure.

Tempo Quarter Note = 68-80bpm. A slow 3/4.

Here is a basic solo fingerstyle arrangement in the key of G. Once you learn the arrangement, try to play it with a capo on the 3rd fret. Let all notes and strings ring as much as possible.
